Prior to the opening of the Grand Council R. Ill. Companion Eugene Sanford escorted the Mayor of Albany before the altar, and said:

Hon. John Boyd Thacher, Mayor of Albany:

"Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companions of the Grand Council, first I want to thank my conductor for the introduction, and may I say if I were to serve as Mayor for fifteen years more I would do it for the request he made today. I want you to know I am deeply happy for being permitted to come here today to extend a very warm welcome to you as you gather here for the Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of the State of New York. As intimated, I gladly welcome you to the oldest of the cities, the birthplace of American freedom and liberty. It has passed through the various struggles, but it has emerged with a stronger faith than ever before, and with a strong conviction that only by adhering to the principles of the institution can the American people continue to endure. I say to you that during the last century and a half, during all the time that Albany has been an American city, the members of the Masonic fraternity have always remained loyal citizens. I welcome many organizations to this city in my duty as Mayor. In these critical moments, as we prepare to defend the principles of our faith and that of the founders of our liberty, we know that no city can be a prosperous place if we care little for these things. If the citizens do not subscribe to the law, government cannot endure in peace and harmony. We today stand as never before a united nation, in order that free people can govern themselves better than can be done in any other way. We must see that the minds of this nation are never corrupted from within, as has been done in other nations. I look to the men in this fraternity to fully discharge their obligations and duties. Speaking for the people of the City of Albany, I am happy to have you here today. I hope you will find renewed strength to carry on your deliberations, and when you go away from here you may be men and Masons more anxious to serve your nation and your God."

"Mr. Mayor and Companion: In behalf of the Grand Council I thank you very much for your kind and sincere words to us. We surely appreciate them very much, for they will contribute to the atmosphere of this gathering today. They will go down in our history. The Grand Master then read the following Address:

#### ADDRESS OF THE GRAND MASTER

There is a destiny that makes us brothers:

None goes his way alone:

All that we send into the lives of others

Comes back into our own.

I care not what his temples or his creeds,

One thing holds firm and fast —

That into his fateful heap of days and deeds

The soul of a man is cast,

—Edwin Markham.

In the name of Brotherhood I welcome you to this, our 117th Annual Assembly. As we are gathered in this quiet and peaceful room, and look into the kindly, friendly faces around us, let us all be grateful to the Supreme Architect of the Universe for this great privilege that is ours today.

It is a privilege, for in many parts of the world today, Masonry is under the ban of a new materialistic social order, which rejects Masonry's gentle philosophy of Universal Brotherhood. And gatherings such as this, designed to promote the spiritual and moral development of mankind, are forbidden to men of peace and good will, men who cherish the same ideals that are yours and mine.

Fortunate indeed are we, that the men whom we call our Masonic forefathers, were chosen to play so important a part in the establishment of this great nation of ours. And to these men, who wove into our national fabric the fine golden threads of Masonic tolerance, we owe a great debt of gratitude.

Masonry must continue to live, and it is our responsibility — yours and mine — to see that it does. All our pride in our illustrious Masonic ancestry is just so much lip-service unless we are prepared to carry forward the work which they began.

Let us say here today, as we meet in this Masonic Assembly, the simple words "God Bless America", the America under whose mighty protection Masonry and all agencies for the common good, have flourished. Let these words of ours carry a pledge — that we will prove ourselves faithful to our

Masonic forefathers by defending with all our resources the nation, which they fought so valiantly to establish.

With this pledge in our hearts, let us turn to the work that lies before us on the Trestle Board.

Ill. Charles B. Weller and R. E. Chalmers L. Pancoast. It was a splendidly attended York Rite gathering and a fine tribute to these four distinguished Masons.
- November 15th, 1939—One of the happiest events of my year as Grand Master was the Dinner given me by my own Council, Union No. 2, at the George Washington Hotel, New York City. There were present about one hundred and fifty Companions, including seven Past Grand Masters and five Grand Line officers. Addresses were made by R. W. Henry C. Turner, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, M. E. R. Pearson Bowles, Grand High Priest, M. Ill. Don Sargent, Past Grand Master of New Jersey, and Most Puissant Charles H. Johnson, General Grand Master.
- January 10th, 1940—On the invitation of M. Ill. E. Parker Waggoner, I attended the installation of officers of Adytum Chapter in Buffalo. It was a very brilliant occasion, graced by the presence of the Grand High Priest, M. E. R. Pearson Bowles, the Grand Commander, R. Em. W. Ray Converse and other distinguished members of York Rite Masonry.
- March 27th, 1940—On invitation of the High Priest, I was the principal speaker at the Fourth Annual Fellowship Dinner of Buckingham Chapter No. 174, Ossining, N. Y. The occasion was a very happy one, the large attendance including two Past Grand High Priests, M. E. Carl Wilhelms and M. E. R. Pearson Bowles.
- May 20th, 1940—On the invitation of the Illustrious Master, I attended the reception to M. Ill. Harold V. B. Voorhis, Grand Master of the Grand Council of New Jersey, tendered by Field Council of Red

Bank, N. J. This was a brilliant occasion, attended by many of the prominent Masons of New Jersey.

January 29th, 1940—On invitation of the High Priest, I was the guest of Empire Chapter No. 170, on the occasion of the visit of the Grand High Priest.

August 14th, 1940—On invitation of our Grand Steward, R. Ill. Irving C. King, I was the guest of King Hiram Council No. 18 at its Annual Beefsteak Dinner, held on Lake Owasco.

The total number of all visits made by me during the past year, including those to my own Council and visits made to Rochester and Albany, in preparation for the Grand Assembly, are 53.

### OFFICIAL VISITATIONS

It has been the conviction of a number of our Past Grand Masters that the method of official visitation, which we employed during the past years, has been of rather doubtful value. Assigning a Grand Officer to make a visit at his own expense to a Council located several hundred miles from his home has always seemed to be rather unfair. Aside from the actual traveling expense, the Grand Council Officer was often obliged to sacrifice several days of productive activity, which he could ill afford in the present business conditions. Being pressed for time, the visiting Grand Officer was often obliged to curtail his visit to such extent that his contact with the visited Council was entirely too short to make an efficient inspection.

Without wishing to make a drastic change in our system of visitation, I believed, nevertheless, that a more common-sense approach to the problem might at least offer an improvement over our old method.

I therefore divided our jurisdiction into Nine Arches, or districts, and assigned to each of the Grand Officers those Councils nearest his residence. This not only reduced the traveling expense of the Official Visitors, but gave them more time to spend with the Councils assigned to them. Also, it enabled the Official Visitor to take with him a delegation from his own Council, thus increasing not only the attendance at the Official Visit, but also establishing closer fraternal relationships among the Councils.

Since it is to our interest that all sections of the State be represented in our Grand Council line, it will not be difficult to continue this plan until such time as we are again in a position to pay the expenses of the Official Visitors.

Judging from the reports I have received, the Grand Officers have been able to exercise a closer supervision over the Councils in their respective districts, and have often been able to make more than one visit to a Council where the need was indicated.

### DISTRICT LECTURERS

In view of the change in the method of Official Visitation, which was put into operation during the past year, I have asked our regular Grand Council Officers to exercise a supervision over the ritualistic work. As they were all most familiar with the territory in which they worked, they were able to exercise a beneficial influence on the ritualistic performance of our Councils. In my many official and informal visits throughout the State, I found that there has been a distinct improvement in our work. This, of course, is partially due to the increase in the number of candidates, on which our Councils were called to confer our Degrees. But, it also reflects considerable credit upon the ritualistic proficiency of our Grand Council Officers.

Some of our Grand Lecturers in the past have called attention to the difficulty of securing qualified Companions to act as District Lecturers. It has been pointed out that the District Lecturer receives no title or special recognition for the amount of time and hard work he is expected to give while in office. He is also expected to pay his own expenses.

It is my opinion, that if we intend to continue the District Lecturer system, we should devise a title, which is permanent and which will be, in a small measure, a reward for the work required of this office. I think the matter should be carefully studied by the Committee on Ritual, and suitable recommendations presented at our next Grand Council Assembly.

#### MEMBERSHIP

While we are obliged to report a loss in membership, this has been reduced to 231, which shows that our losses have been steadily decreasing for several years. This is partially accounted for by the fact that we have greeted 138 new members during the past year, which is a gain of about 40% over each of the past two years. Our suspensions and dismissals have also decreased considerably over the past two years. However, our deaths remain about the same in numbers as during the two previous administrations. Happily, they are somewhat fewer in number, but they still remain a formidable factor to be reckoned with.

It is encouraging to note that our suspensions are fewer than ever before, indicating a disposition on the part of our Councils to use every effort to retain their membership. The days of the suspending of Companions without adequate investigation of the causes of delinquency seem to be over, and we are growing more careful in conserving our membership.

There is still much room for improvement, however. It is true we have greeted 138 Companions during the past year, but with the large field, from which we can draw, this is rather a small number. I have always wondered why the real work was always done by a certain few Councils throughout the State, and I determined that I would make a careful study of the situation during my year as Grand Master.

It is very simple—the Councils that are doing the work have a definite, workable plan to secure new material. They do not go at it in a haphazard fashion, but they carefully canvass all available material from lists, which they secure from their neighboring Chapters. I strongly recommend to all Councils that they follow this plan and make a systematic canvass of all Royal Arch Masons, who reside within their jurisdictional limits and who are not affiliated with any Council.

#### THE BUDGET

Ever since the year 1929—up to last year—our General Fund was out of balance, because we paid out some \$600. per year more than we took in. It became apparent in 1938, therefore, that we could not keep on at this rate, and that some action would have to be taken to make our income cover our expenses. Accordingly, we increased our per capita tax to sixty cents per member, and last year—for the first time—we balanced the budget.

Up to the year 1932 our per capita tax was seventy cents per member, but at that time we reduced it to fifty cents, which was so unbusinesslike a proceeding that we wound up with a deficit of \$800.

It is manifest from our past experience that we must continue the per capita tax of sixty cents per member. We cannot reduce the expenses of Grand Council further unless we stop paying mileage and per diem, which is our one large item of expense.

At the end of last year we showed a small credit balance, which is more than offset by the fact that the mileage and per diem payments at Buffalo—which were paid by the present administration—exceeded those of the previous year by \$334.86, so that this year we will about break even.

It is therefore my recommendation, based upon careful study, that we continue the per capita tax of sixty cents per member.

#### CONCLUSION

Before I step down from the Grand East to take my place once more with my Companions on the side lines, I wish to take this opportunity to

express my heartfelt gratitude to my Officers for the splendid support they gave me during the past year. Whatever forward steps our Grand Council has taken during my administration have been the result of the hard and conscientious work performed by the Grand Line Officers. Without exception, their consideration and cooperation have made my tasks light and pleasant, and as a result this past year will live in my memory as the most enjoyable experience in my Masonic career.

We have made some progress, but there still remain some very grave problems for us to solve. Before we can say that we have the situation well in hand, we must register a gain in membership rather than a loss. The fact that we have over a period of years steadily cut down our losses leads me to hope that we may soon achieve that goal.

It has been my privilege to serve this Grand Council in various capacities for over two decades. Many of the men, with whom I served on important committees, have gone to their reward. I recall these men today as the leaders of our Rite, who gave direction and guidance to our Grand Council. We, who are met here today, have inherited the mantle of leadership bequeathed to us by these stalwarts of our Craft.

My closing words are a prayer to our Heavenly Father that He will give us the strength and the vision to carry forward the work of this Grand Council as it was begun and continued by those who have gone before, that He will look down with loving kindness upon our humble efforts and prosper them.

My Companions, the business of this 117th Annual Assembly is now before you.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE  
ON CONDITION AND EXTENSION OF THE RITE**

The Committee on Condition and Extension of the Rite presented the following report, which, on motion, was received and accepted.

Albany, N. Y., September 9, 1940.

To the Grand Council:

Your Committee on Condition and Extension of the Rite respectfully reports as follows:

Thick clouds of darkness and despair have settled over large portions of the earth, obscuring the sun, and have all but extinguished the Great Light of Masonry for our Brethren in many distant lands. As we pass through another cycle in our advance toward perfection we are confronted with the philosophy that might is right; that force and greed march hand in hand and that an effort is being made to banish truth, justice and liberty from the face of the earth.

Is it to be wondered at that during this most trying period in the world's history, when even the fate of our own fair land hangs trembling in the balance, and when we are one of the few countries left on earth where the practice of the principles of Masonry is still permitted, our beloved Craft should suffer losses in membership.

Your committee, after a careful examination of the record for the past year, is pleased to report that the number of new Companions greeted has increased and our losses have diminished during the past year. The following summary for the past two years will show the progress made:

Statistics show that eight out of 46 Councils in our jurisdiction showed an increase in membership. Catskill Council, No. 78, and Triangle Council, No. 85, are tied for first honors, with a net increase of 15 each; Corning Council, No. 53, is third, with an increase of 6; Hornellsville Council, No. 35, is fourth, with an increase of 4; Jamestown Council, No. 32, and Huntington Council, No. 76, are fifth and sixth, with an increase of 2 each; Phoenix Council, No. 70, and Ancient City Council, No. 21, are seventh and eighth, with an increase of 1 each. This year 28 Councils reported the greeting of new Companions. This is an increase of 11 Councils doing work this year. If we class those Councils doing no work as dormant Councils, we have 18 on our Roster. We would recommend that these Councils be given special attention by our Grand Master during the coming year.

We would call the attention of the Grand Council again to that portion of our report of last year as follows:

"We believe that each District should have a capable and energetic leader who is responsible for the losses in his district. We think he should have the title of a Grand Council officer and should have a jewel for his office. The apron should be provided by his Council. We believe that he should

be properly clothed and have authority in his district. You might call him a District Representative, District Deputy Grand Master, Assistant Grand Lecturer, or any other title that is deemed proper. These leaders should hold conventions in their respective districts and visit the Councils under their jurisdiction. They should be the real leaders and should be subject to the call of all the Masters and Councils in their district. They should find out why some of the Councils are not functioning and what is needed to bring them back into action. These officers should be appointed annually and should be continued in office for a period of at least three years, if satisfactory results are secured by them. Quarterly reports should be made by them to our Grand Master and our Grand Lecturer. It will be necessary to amend our Constitution in order to put the above plan into practice, and we recommend that a committee be appointed to formulate such a plan during the coming year together with the formation of the necessary proposed amendments to our Constitution to carry the same into effect."

We believe this more important to the districts up State by reason of their geographical locations and the impracticability of constant and close supervision over them by a Grand Council officer.

We note from the Returns that some of our Councils have suffered heavy losses; occasioned chiefly by dimits and suspensions. One Council reported a loss of nearly 20%, occasioned chiefly by dimits and suspensions. While we have no way of knowing the reason of such a loss, we do believe that if this Council had a Membership Welfare Committee on the job to make personal contact with the member suspended that it might have been possible to save many of them for our Rite.

And this brings up again the matter of Restorations. The record shows that in every case where an earnest and sincere effort has been made success has followed. There are no hard and fast rules to be laid down in this service to our former Companions. Our approach to the problem should be in the spirit of helpfulness. Different conditions require different treatment. The loss in revenue to the Council should be forgotten except in cases where the Companion is now in good circumstances. Above all we should seek to show the Companion that HE is wanted and needed in our midst. Service such as this should win back into our fold many who are now wandering aimlessly outside our lodge rooms, when they would and should help us carry the load if we but ask them. Remember, Companions, one member saved is a victory for the Cryptic Rite.

After a study and breakdown of the records of several Councils we were surprised to find that the majority of the membership of said Councils were over 50 years of age. What does this signify? Does it not mean that the mortality rate is bound to rise if we do not plan ahead and if we do not take steps to attract young men into our ranks?

What inducement do we offer to the young men to knock at our doors? Will they be interested in joining any organization that simply opens and closes and does not provide any means of entertainment? Will we be able to hold our Candidates if they witness poor and unimpressive degree work? These are some of the questions to consider.

We believe that the real test for the future is in the high moral character and ability of the men you select to lead your Councils. Strive to make your meetings interesting and attractive. Give more attention to the degree work. Plan entertainment when you have no degree work. A good speaker and a lunch will always attract the Companions. The need of the hour is constructive and energetic leadership.

Companions, the conditions in the world to-day demand a united effort on the part of each and every member of the Craft to do his utmost in the preservation of those most sacred privileges handed down to us by our forefathers. Truth, justice and liberty, the most sacred tenets of our Order, have no place under the plans of any dictator. So let us labor to the end

that Freemasonry shall stand united in the bonds of brotherhood, and that our Craft and our Republic shall continue in honor.

### REPORT OF GRAND LECTURER

To the Grand Council:

Owing to the departure from previous custom, District Lecturers were not appointed this year as in the past, therefore no report of the existing conditions appertaining to the ritualistic work of the constituent Councils of the several districts. The Grand Lecturer not having been called upon to inspect work other than in Councils to which he was assigned by our Grand Master to visit officially, he is unable to give you detailed report of actual conditions existing throughout the State.

My observation at the seven Councils which I did visit officially and unofficial visits to other Councils indicate that each Council is endeavoring to carry out the standard ritualistic work, but due to lack of Candidates very little degree work was performed.

Personally I believe that the interests of our Rite can be better served by the restoration of District Lecturers, and owing to widely separated Councils geographically, suggest that Council Lecturers be selected, either by appointment, or designation, to supervise the ritualistic work in his respective Council under the direction of District or Grand Lecturer. Great care, however, should be observed in these selections, to the end that only those who are capable, proficient and energetic are allowed to occupy these positions and their work be later recognized according to its merit.

I further suggest that as soon as the proposed changes in our Ritual have been perfected, revised, and finances permit, that new Rituals be printed and supplied to the officers of constituent Councils and others be made available for purchase by Past Masters and other members interested in the work.

At this time M. Ex. Charles J. Wells, Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of New York State was recognized by the Grand Master. M. Ex. Companion Wells presented to the Grand Council a list of all the Companions who had been exalted or affiliated in the several Chapters of the State during the calendar year of 1939. In presenting these lists the Grand High Priest made the following remarks:

"Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companions: The cooperation of the bodies, to make that more than a gesture of good will, though we do not want to eliminate these, it has been our good fortune to obtain a complete list of all exaltations and affiliations in the State, two complete lists which I am going to dispose of this afternoon. We all know it is difficult for Councils to obtain lists of Chapter members. We want you to feel the Grand Chapter is back of you. We are interested in your welfare and the Grand Commandery. It was with considerable effort we obtained these two lists. We had difficulty in our office in getting them out. The stenographer was unable to take her vacation. The Grand Master then called attention to a beautiful basket of Flowers which had graced the East during the sessions of the Grand Council, and read the following card, which accompanied the same:

"The Members of Albany Assembly, Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus, sends fraternal greetings to the Grand Council of the Royal and Select Masters of the Masonic Order of the State of New York, and extends their best wishes for a most successful meeting.

On a motion, duly made and carried, the Grand Recorder was directed to express the thanks and appreciation of the Grand Council for this expression of Fraternal greeting.

M. Ill. Raymond E. Westbury said there has been some comment because Past Masters of Councils have not received notice of the dates and places of the Grand Assemblies, and said the reason was that the Grand Recorder had no list of the present postoffice addresses of these Past Masters. In order to correct this, so that there could be no further criticism M. Ill. Companion Westbury offered the following amendment to the Grand Council Constitution:

"That Subdivision 4 of Section 28 of the Constitution of the Grand Council be amended by adding the words: "including the names and addresses of all living Past Masters of the Council," in the second line thereof, so that the subdivision will read:

"Sec. 28. Subdivision 4. To make a full and complete Return to the Grand Council annually, of all the members of the Council, *including the names and addresses of all living Past Masters of the Council*, and all changes in membership, in such form and at such time as may be required by General Regulations."

This amendment was adopted by unanimous consent, and therefore is now a part of the Grand Council Constitution.

M. Ill. S. Ormond Goldan:

In the name of the Grand Council we wish to express our appreciation of the splendid demonstration given us by the Companions of DeWitt Clinton Council, No. 22. I am sure that you and the ladies appreciate all that has been done. For the very hearty welcome from the Mayor and DeWitt Clinton Council, for the very splendid work done for us, I ask that we have a rising vote of our appreciation and thanks for all that has been done for us.

Unanimously adopted by rising vote.

The time having now arrived for the Installation of Officers, Grand Master Feih called upon M. P. Companion Charles H. Johnson to conduct the installation, but before proceeding with the installation asked him to say a few words to the Grand Council.

M. P. Charles H. Johnson, General Grand Master of the General Grand Council of the United States of America:

"One of the duties that goes with this office is that the General Grand Master must visit as many Grand Councils as possible. This task is distributed over three years. I have visited eight Grand Councils and expect to visit five more this year. In visiting these Grand Councils of Washington and Missouri and the other four places, they do not know you, and some have respect and sometimes fear for you. The first thing you have to do is to show them you are all right. The situation is quite different from here. Here I am known and cannot put up the bluff you have to tell the others when you are far from home. I saw in these various Grand Councils certain things similar to some of the problems here and elsewhere—dues, demits and securing new membership—general throughout the country. Everywhere they have the same problems. Everybody talks about the difficult times and the very serious problems we have to face. Worry conscious. What are we going to do about it? This attitude is deplorable. Has not the time come to get out of this defeatist attitude? Not to accept defeat and make up our minds to put defeat out of the picture. I was attending the Washington Memorial. I went to the platform. The chairman said, Charlie is going to make a speech. The only thing that came to my mind was "So what?" We have a good time here. Many social advantages. Delighted with the good reports from the Committees and the Grand Master's Report. "So what?" Should not this Grand Council be an encouragement? Put those things into fact. No Grand Master alone can bring success to the Grand Council of the State of New York. It can only be done by the labors of the members in the Councils. Is it not now the time we should go back to the Councils having in mind the coming year will not be a continuation of the previous years of defeat. When we get together at the next Grand Assembly bring in the sheaves. The responsibility rests on the individual. Would not this Grand Assembly have its most desirable result if we go back to our respective Councils determined that in our Councils the coming year things shall be done. Then our Grand Council would be "Grand" indeed. Companions, in this present office I bring you the greetings of the Cryptic Rite throughout the country. I end with this admonition that we shall set here in the Empire State an example and inspiration for the Councils throughout the country. What New York can do they can do. I convey my very best wishes for the most successful year this Grand Council has ever had."

The newly elected officers were then installed by M. P. Charles H. Johnson, M. Ill. Companion Edward Feih acting as Grand Marshal.

M. Ill. Chester D. Crowell, Grand Master, presiding, spoke as follows:

"I appreciate the beautiful way you installed the officers of this Grand Council. Your words will be taken to heart. I feel this is not the time or place for remarks from the Grand Master. During the year you may hear from me. I think you will realize there is meat in the words we have heard. We can see there is much for us to do. M. P. Companion Johnson sounded a key note. Let us accept conditions as they are as a challenge to Masonry. Let us meet our responsibility with enthusiasm. Let us try to inspire them to more responsibility. With your help, which I hope and pray you will give to me, I look forward to a successful term."

M. P. Charles H. Johnson:

"Past Grand Master Feih, you have now joined the exalted Order of "Has Beens." Being one myself I speak for them. You will have memories

of passing through the line and the year you served as Grand Master. The only compensation is to know you tried to do a good piece of work. You have done so. We are proud you have done it. It is desired by the Grand Council that you should have some little souvenir. The souvenir is not of great value. It represents the sincere good wishes of the Grand Council. I present this token in the spirit given, not as a complete token of appreciation but as to how we feel for you and what we have in our hearts, with the hope that for many years to come you will wear it with pleasure."

M. Ill. Edward Feih:

"I know you are sincere in the words you have just spoken. I know it is not merely perfunctory. I have loved this work. The privilege to know the men I have during the past years would be sufficient reward. When I look around me I feel I am fortunate indeed. I know they are well disposed toward me. My friends are my greatest treasure. I am indebted to the Grand Council for adding to my circle of friends. The sentiments that come with it are thoroughly reciprocated. I thank you."

M. Ex. Companion Charles J. Wells, Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of New York, then, on behalf of the Grand Council, presented an Apron to M. Ill. Companion Crowell.

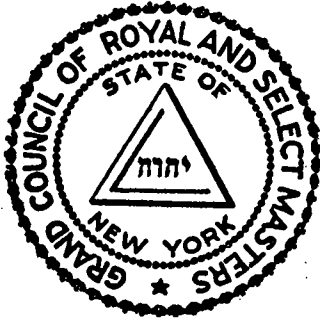
